


Mission

What is Community Violence?

 The physical, emotional, and financial pain from experiencing or witnessing violence affects individuals, their families, and communities.

 Homicides and other violent acts cause substantial harm in communities across the country, especially in racially segregated and high-poverty neighborhoods.



"How can you allow structural and systemic injustice to persist in our environments robbing us of our peers, exposing us to trauma, isolating us in fiscally deprived communities and then suggest that interpersonal violence is a problem catalyzed by youths?"

Effect of Community Violence on Youth





2021 Data for High School Students

- ➤ 18% were involved in physical fight
- > 15% were bullied in school
- > 5% carried a firearm



Impact of Community Violence on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)

Potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood (0-17 years):

- Experiencing violence, abuse, or neglect.
- Witnessing violence in the community due to drugs or gangs.
- Having a family member attempt or die by suicide.
- Experiencing a natural disaster.





The Power of OST!



- OST programs prevent community violence by engaging community members.
- OST programs can implement prevention programs.
- OST programs can support street outreach programs and activities, partner with schools to ensure students have safe routes to walk to and from school and provide supervision during critical times of the day.
